Introduction

This is the fourth District Policing Partnership Survey to be carried out by the Central Survey Unit of the Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency, the previous surveys having been carried out in 2003, 2004 and 2006.

This postal survey involved questionnaires being sent out to 71,500 households across Northern Ireland, selected at random from the Land and Property Services list of addresses. Unique identifiers were included with the questionnaires to enable results to be broken down by District Command Unit (DPP boundaries are identical to District Command Unit boundaries).

This document presents the results from the survey for Fermanagh District Council.

17	<i>At present police patrol Brookeborough Main St. Approx 3hr (1day per week) leave at lunchtime in mobile unit, more night time presence is required i.e.: young drivers and young people out and about on Main streets for multiple of hours</i>
18	<i>Because I have confidence in our police force should I need them they are there and I feel safe with that thought</i>
19	<i>Because it is a difficult job</i>
20	<i>Because of the level of underage drinking and the fact that they can buy it so openly and walk around the town with it in carry bags</i>
21	<i>Because PSNI impartial now. Equality. Better service</i>
22	<i>Because there are no extreme incidents in this area</i>
23	<i>Because there pretty prompt to assist on a phone call and they visit our town every week in there mobile unit</i>
24	<i>Because they are very helpful</i>
25	<i>Because we experienced less nuisance from young people as compared with the previous year of our stay here.</i>
26	<i>Can't explain</i>
27	<i>Catch the real criminals and leave the wee people alone.</i>
28	<i>Could do a lot more to stop youths drinking in public areas.</i>
29	<i>Could do some more speed checks on weekend nights and early mornings i.e. 1-3 am</i>
30	<i>Crime has increased in Irvinestown. Police presence in the town would be very helpful</i>
31	<i>Crime is still on the up.</i>
32	<i>Dissatisfied due to young people being left off for creating a nuisance and police themselves when made aware saying they cannot do anything as they are just children!!!</i>
33	<i>Do not see a police presence when it is needed at weekends in the early hours of the morning also on main roads at night there are young male motorists racing, nobody seems to be stopping them.</i>
34	<i>Don't have any reason to have dealing with the police, but you never know when you need them</i>

35	<i>Don't have many dealing with them, but when we do we are generally very happy with the response</i>
36	<i>Don't know anything about it</i>
37	<i>Don't know who they are, or what they do</i>
38	<i>Don't see police here very often</i>
39	<i>Don't think they can do much more unless they have more manpower</i>
40	<i>Dont know enough of what is going on in our area</i>
41	<i>Even though we don't have a police station police are still close at hand if they are needed.</i>
42	<i>Every time I have had to call on the police I have found them to be both helpful and prompt</i>
43	<i>Feel more could be done to make people at ease in their homes & on the streets</i>
44	<i>Feel they could be more on the streets especially after disco's.</i>
45	<i>Find the police OK. Just need more police checkpoints on the Tempo Road to reduce speeding.</i>
46	<i>Found police helpful when I was in difficulty with bad phone calls and other trouble from a few people.</i>
47	<i>Generally ok about crime level. Police presence was noted when required</i>
48	<i>Generally satisfied but more resources personnel and financial is required to tackle the issues prioritised above</i>
49	<i>Good relationship with PSNI, always courteous. A system of recording warnings, i.e. A hand held computer linked to a database, which could record warnings and on second offence a fine.</i>
50	<i>Good show of police on foot patrol in Irvinestown.</i>
51	<i>Had reason to call the police to my house because of youths once throwing stones at my windows and another time eggs with paint thinners in them. Outcome not very successful.</i>
52	<i>Have had to move form my flat of 4 years because of boy racers. Police seem to have a 'boys will be boys' attitude rather than viewing same as potential and actual killers, disturbers of the peace and intimidators</i>
53	<i>Have heard no complaints</i>
54	<i>Have never had any dealings with the police personally but would also like to keep it that way</i>
55	<i>Have never had any problems with the police. I've always found them generally courteous and helpful but there is a definite lack of their presence.</i>
56	<i>Have no evidence from personal experience to say otherwise. I think there's always room for improvement but can't say that I'm dissatisfied with the current level of policing.</i>
57	<i>Have not seen police on our road in past 12 months</i>
58	<i>Have noticed a significant increase in local foot patrols during the day. Patrols like this would go a long way to reducing underage drinking and youths hanging around the streets on weekends. Drinking fine notices need better enforcement to clean up local parks. 13-16 year olds need targeting maybe through liaison programmes in school.</i>
59	<i>Haven't experienced personally an issue in the last 12 months but uncomfortable in town at night and weekend</i>
60	<i>I am a past member of security forces. I was followed in a car between [place name deleted] and [place name deleted] and also on the same year I got a threatening phone call to a shop where I was working which was not investigated.</i>
61	<i>I am an elderly person and have never had any police advice on prevention of attacks on the elderly/ bogus callers, or any prevention systems fitted in my home</i>
62	<i>I am aware we don't have police numbers to cope with all situations and hence response to situations is slow and sometimes impossible.</i>
63	<i>I am not aware we have police in our area, but I expect there must be some</i>
64	<i>I am not sufficiently aware of the level of policing problems to mark 'very satisfied', but the police, through their mobile unit, are available to the local community.</i>
65	<i>I am personally satisfied with the policing but feel that the lack of resources overall on the police leave them stretched and unable to come up to the expectations of others</i>
66	<i>I am unaware of any issues as never had any dealings with the police</i>
67	<i>I believe more police time could be spent on more important issues that petty crimes such as using mobile phones doing 33 mph in 30mph</i>

68	<i>I can't remember how long it is from I saw a policeman on patrol in Kesh or stopped at a checkpoint.</i>
69	<i>I don't know very much about policing in my area as I haven't needed the police</i>
70	<i>I don't see a lot of evidence of police presence.</i>
71	<i>I don't see police in my area very often.</i>
72	<i>I feel police try to do their best and help everyone</i>
73	<i>I feel satisfied enough. Personally I don't have a problem.</i>
74	<i>I feel there's no real difference with the police force</i>
75	<i>I feel there is much more to be done and hopefully if numbers of police are increased over time and a continued involvement with local groups is maintained one will see a marked improvement in a support for the rule of the law.</i>
76	<i>I have confidence in the level of policing.</i>
77	<i>I have had no dealings with the police since I moved here some five years ago.</i>
78	<i>I have had no experience with being personally involved with policing in my area. Many people form the opinion that very often reports of incidents reported to the police are not dealt with in a serious manner.</i>
79	<i>I have had to deal with the police so I wouldn't know how they approach policing.</i>
80	<i>I have never had any dealings with the police or indeed see them around that much</i>
81	<i>I have never seen any police presence at any time in my area</i>
82	<i>I have noticed through our local papers that the police are more involved in our community. I feel the police have made more of an effort to become an accepted and respected part of our community</i>
83	<i>I have only had one occasion to call the police and I found them prompt and helpful.</i>
84	<i>I have seen no figures to see if there is an improvement in society relating to crime, violence etc. So I can't say if I'm satisfied or dissatisfied with them</i>
85	<i>I haven't been personally affected by crime and therefore don't have experience of policing, however I recognise that this may be due to good policing !</i>
86	<i>I just don't think there are enough police patrols on duty daily. The weekends in the town of Enniskillen are bad, people feel unsafe due to assaults and violence in the area. Too many reasons to say (etc).</i>
87	<i>I like to see the PSNI patrolling the roads especially the rural areas</i>
88	<i>I live in a fairly affluent area where crime levels are low so police presence is not particularly needed</i>
89	<i>I live in a rural area and feel that there is not the same patrolling in the area as when the troubles were here and feel there has been a rise in crime, such as burglaries in the area because of this</i>
90	<i>I live in a rural area and never see a police presence, car or otherwise.</i>
91	<i>I live in a rural area where, thankfully, there is little to no crime. So it's quite easy to police compared to a town - so I'm satisfied with policing, but speeding could be tackled better.</i>
92	<i>I note more foot patrols in town centre. Two friends have had reason to contact police in the last year- burglary and assault. Both spoke well of how they were treated</i>
93	<i>I rarely see a police car or foot patrol. All police presence seems to be concentrated on Maguiresbridge, Lisbellaw and Enniskillen. I would like to see more police presence on roads to crack down on speeding and prevent burglaries.</i>
94	<i>I rarely see police on the ground in Co Fermanagh and judging by the amount of statistics being produced by PSNI (some useless), I think far too much police time is taken up filling in forms, etc. Which would be much better used in talking to local people/befriending and gathering information.</i>
95	<i>I rarely see the police - lack of manpower</i>
96	<i>I see a lot of disregard for the law. The police are never there and it continues year to year.</i>
97	<i>I see no problem with police force in Belleek. They are about in cars on the street. I never see police walking the street. We could do with a bit more of them on the beat on the street</i>
98	<i>I think crime level is less and better regard for police in this area</i>
99	<i>I think its piecemeal and under resourced having said that many individual officers are excellent and my responses do not take away from that.</i>

100	<i>I think that the police work well with the people and since peace is here people are not afraid to talk to them now</i>
101	<i>I think they're doing all they can to provide a policing service</i>
102	<i>I think they are trying to do a good job.</i>
103	<i>I think they do a fairly good job in most cases but the problem in our area is with boy racers. I think they could do a lot more as this problem has been going on for years and seems to be getting worse.</i>
104	<i>I think this area is a safe place to live compared to other places in the news</i>
105	<i>I thought much more could be done to find out who damaged my car and find out and put away those who rob and destroy other peoples property.</i>
106	<i>I understand that in a lot of areas the polices hands are tied to a certain extent, however the problems seem to be ongoing</i>
107	<i>I very seldom see police in my area</i>
108	<i>I was stopped twice in last 12mths for "traffic offences" the 1st resulted in a fixed penalty fine which I was afraid to contest as I was alone in the car. The 2nd resulted in a warning only because I contested that any offence had been committed. I felt that the traffic police were going after an easy target, which appeared to be target based.</i>
109	<i>I would like to see more foot patrols or vehicle patrols in my area.</i>
110	<i>I would like to see move police action re dangerous roads use- especially young drivers speeding- in cars, quads and motorbikes- who at present can be assured they are unlikely to be apprehended by police</i>
111	<i>I would rarely see police in my community</i>
112	<i>If accident in area police won't come out unless injured. Most of the time a lot of drivers with no insurance or tax</i>
113	<i>If you live near town area you get stopped for having a light out. If live in a border area they get away with a hell of a lot more. I know come on PSNI tighten up- move out past 5 mile radius. (Thank you).</i>
114	<i>In the last 12 months I have not seen a police person in Belleek/Garnison area</i>
115	<i>Increased car crime</i>
116	<i>Increased police presence</i>
117	<i>Intermittent crime activity but overall I am not aware of problems on day to day basis</i>
118	<i>It's 2 miles to nearest station</i>
119	<i>It's important that people see the police patrolling the areas, especially at night after pubs close. Too many motorists still driving under the influence of alcohol.</i>
120	<i>It could be worse - when you hear about other areas.</i>
121	<i>Lack of enforcement of laws: 1. Regarding lorry drivers permanently on the phone, 2. Laissez-faire attitude to the intimidatory presence of aggressive inebriated young people on our streets.</i>

175	<i>Not enough manpower to cover the problems.</i>
176	<i>Not enough police at weekends to combat drunken behaviour and vandalism. Not enough walking patrols. Police not responding quickly to emergencies.</i>
177	<i>Not enough police officers available to cover a widespread and rural area</i>

193	<i>Nothing ever done about what is perceived as low level crime - vandalism - burglary etc. No presence of police at risk times and little or no response</i>

197	<i>Only "satisfied" due to police hands being tied when it goes so far. When required have been helpful but would like the main issues in NI to be dealt with fairly</i>
198	<i>Only been in N.I. For 6 months.</i>
199	<i>Only one police person in area dealing with crime prevention. This woman is very dedicated to this job but has to cover a very large area. She needs help</i>
200	<i>Over the last 10 years I've only seen the police 5 times in our area</i>
201	<i>Overall not bad area to live in. Policing is adequate more of the time</i>

202	<i>Overall police tend to do a good job but drivers are still using mobile phones when driving and blocking exits/entrances by driving onto the yellow box when they can't go on</i>
203	<i>Perception now is ' What's the point ?' with regard to the question, ' Should we phone the police ?'.</i>
204	<i>Personal reasons relating to domestic violence & abuse leading to a lack of confidence in local police</i>
205	<i>Police are doing a good job, but we need more police on the streets, particularly at night. I think the problem lies in the courts in terms of persistent offenders, assaults should be more severely punished</i>
206	<i>Police are doing the best they can with their resources</i>
207	<i>Police are never seen in my area, no road stops of any kind</i>
208	<i>Police are never seen until something happens then they are out for a day and away again until something occurs again, they should be out foot patrolling, especially at night in this town, please see about this matter</i>
209	<i>Police are never seen. Don't know where my local Police Station is - it used to be Rosslea. I am in my nineties and feel insecure and unprotected.</i>
210	<i>Police are no longer respectful very arrogant take spite at families who have stepped out offline but are no longer in trouble</i>
211	<i>Police are seldom seen in my area.</i>
212	<i>Police are seldom seen in the area. In the case of accidents they are not interested in investigating these, from personal experience</i>
213	<i>Police are slow in arriving at houses with problems and young children annoying elderly people. Very good at traffic accidents in our area</i>
214	<i>Police are too restricted in their role, young people get off with too much, should be sent to army instead of jail for minor offences. Judges have a lot to answer for, police spend too much time on paper work</i>
215	<i>Police are under staffed but work to the best of their ability.</i>
216	<i>Police can not do everything, and be every where at the same time. In my area it is young people joy riding around the road and leaving the cars in old lanes crashed</i>

224	<i>Policing is becoming more "fire brigade" orientated & cost conscious than trying to provide a service to the community</i>
225	<i>Policing not concentrated more to what is for example people dealing drugs</i>
226	<i>Prevalence of public drunkenness, vandalism, young people causing nuisance, racing cars and horn blowing at nights. Shouting and fighting at night particularly at week ends.</i>
227	<i>Prompt response to reported crime</i>
228	<i>PSNI are doing their best despite less manpower on ground</i>
229	<i>PSNI do what they can in a very difficult job</i>
230	<i>PSNI in Fermanagh seem to have limited cover at weekends and at night, therefore large sections of the county remain unpatrolled.</i>
231	<i>Rarely see police in this area. Break-ins are increasing. Might help if they patrolled more during the day</i>
232	<i>Recent incidents have been dealt with promptly and effectively.</i>
233	<i>Satisfied</i>
234	<i>Satisfied because they're doing a good job.</i>

235	<i>Satisfied that police are doing the best they can. Would like to see more police in rural areas. Also more speed checks</i>
236	<i>Satisfied with policing but would like to see more patrols</i>
237	<i>See question 7</i>
238	<i>Since the local police barracks closed a few years ago, there has been very little police presence - they are an invisible group. Its leaves many pensioners, especially single women, like me, very nervous at night, even with a burglar alarm, and good neighbours.</i>
239	<i>Sitting on their ass and taking easy targets</i>
240	<i>Slow response to incidents. Lack of action against wrong doers</i>
241	<i>Still a lot of stealing in the area and speeding. A lot of traffic on the Ballyconnell to Derrylin Road, with both lorries and cars speeding and never a police checkpoint on this road.</i>
242	<i>Talking of my area over the past year or two we seem to have a decrease in break-ins or vandalism etc..</i>
243	<i>Thankfully I haven't had cause to be in contact with the police but there are areas they need to improve on</i>
244	<i>Thankfully, I live in a quiet area and have had no problems much with crime. I believe that the police would come if I called them or needed them.</i>
245	<i>The amount of PSNI we have do their best. But there is a need for a lot more.</i>
246	<i>The area I live in the elderly get no respect from the police. They can get off with anything. They can stand in your garden and drink and they get away with it.</i>
247	<i>The biggest problems are drug dealing and taking and also careless driving. There is not enough law enforcement on drugs. The drug dealers are selling them on the streets, in the pubs and clubs in Lisnaskea. And are getting away with it. And are charging as little as 50p per tablet.</i>
248	<i>The general law and order situation is satisfactory</i>
249	<i>The level of patrolling/police presence has reduced dramatically. There are now insufficient police to patrol efficiently in the area. Do the DPP ever call unannounced at police station and check on availability of response/foot patrol levels</i>
250	<i>The only time I ever see a policeman is sitting or standing with a hairdryer or camera trying to catch someone slightly over the speed limit or with no tax. Bring back the police on the beat in our towns and villages and give them the power to deal with disorderly behaviour and crime and have the courts impose much stiffer sentences.</i>
251	<i>The only time I notice a police presence is behind a camera on the road</i>
252	<i>The police are doing their best</i>
253	<i>The police are not available. Times you would think that policing does not exist. Ey would get a motorist doing a little over the 30 mph, but you witness motorists speeding and very dangerous driving they never seem to be got.</i>
254	<i>The police do a difficult job in difficult circumstances often with little community support!</i>
255	<i>The police do not come out and cannot be got for genuine cases.</i>
256	<i>The police in the area seem more concerned with policing the roads - catching people speeding for minor offences whereas they're often no-where to be seen when people are assaulted up the hours on a Saturday night & it is common knowledge that most young people are now into drugs in a big way.</i>
257	<i>The PSNI are doing a good job with limited resources.</i>
258	<i>The young officers do not appear to be interested in talking to members of the public. They have very poor local knowledge and their general appearance when out in public leaves a lot to be desired.</i>
259	<i>There are insufficient police resources. I am aware that some police sections are so low that officers are taking observer turns every other day. Officers cannot routinely patrol due to paperwork loads and deadlines</i>

Technical Notes

1.1 The Sample

A sample of 71,500 addresses was drawn at random from the Land and Property Services list of addresses, giving a representative sample for each of the District Council areas.

The Land and Property Services list provides a good sampling frame of addresses, but contains no information about the number of people living at an address.

1.2 Methodology

The survey was conducted using a postal questionnaire. A questionnaire was sent to the occupier of each address at the beginning of February 2008 and accompanied with a pre-paid return envelope. Respondents were asked to complete and return their replies to Central Survey Unit by the 29th February 2008.

On the 29th February 2008 a reminder letter was sent out with a new return deadline of the 14th March 2008. As all replies were anonymous, the reminder letter was mailed to all addresses.

1.3 Response

In total 12,044 replies were received, which translated into an overall response rate of 17%.

There was however a difference in response rates across the District Councils, as can be seen in Table 1.1 below.

1.4 Representativeness of the Sample

In any survey there is a possibility of non-response bias. Non-response bias arises if the characteristics of non-respondents differ from those of respondents in such a way that they are reflected in the responses given in the survey. Accurate estimates of non-response bias can be obtained by comparing characteristics of the achieved sample with the distribution in the population at the time of sampling. Such comparisons are usually made to the current Census of Population data. It should be noted however that the questionnaire was not sent to a named person, rather the occupier of the address.

To assess how accurately the achieved sample of the District Policing Partnership Survey reflects the population of Northern Ireland, the sample has been compared with characteristics of the Northern Ireland population from the 2001 Census of Population. The DPP sample has also been compared to the achieved sample of the Continuous Household Survey (CHS).
